One of the earlier written examples of it can be seen in the April 1977 statement of the black feminist group, Combahee River Collective, which was reprinted in a number of compendiums, and Barbara Smith and the Combahee River Collective have been credited with coining the term. Following that ,a lot of attention and momentum has been gained through various social movement involving feminism movements ,LGBT social movements, Queer nationalism, Political lesbianism, and Bisexual politics that has broadened or enlarged the scope of such ideologies from being wom-en centric to supporting movements of all genders and sexuality or women of backward castes such as Dalits (specifically in India).

Now a days most of these movements are not taking place in a conventional rally or dharnas or hunger strikes, rather they involve ways that capture the attention of youngsters and all learning minds in the forms of mass communications like books and films, now in a generation with a high data speed and unconventional techniques, tv series and youtube originals etc are also being used to convey the real and raw concerns of every community mentioned. The reason for the reliability is because they are written or directed or portrayed by people who are involved in the issue in real life which puts them in a better place to explain. Ans there has been some tremendous tv series, movies and books that has managed to capture these movements and successfully convey the audience that they wanted to deliver regarding the struggles and empowerment in the later part.

In the early 1970s, the Dalit movement has caught fast pace in the country of India. Another gem of a film is Not for Ourselves Alone: The Story of Elizabeth Cady Stanton & Susan B. Anthony, a 1999 film documentary about the most significant movement of adult suffrage for women. The film, in the short film period covered the short comings of the patriarchal society and how the two women identifies the inequality and created a movement of change in their era. Unfortunately the women could not survive long enough to see their dream coming true but the film would remain in the history as a cult classics as an initiative towards identity politics for women rights.
